COURSE DESCRIPTION

Course Regulations

- The course is open to both internal and external students
- We advise all Erasmus+ students and other international exchange students to take a preliminary Italian language online free course such as Duolingo in order to accommodate their arrival in Italy.
- **Placement tests** will be held on the following date to ensure that students are attending the appropriate level
 - Internal students, Erasmus+ students and other international exchange students at 14.00 on the 17th of September
- Students who have attended at least 25 hours out of 42 will be allowed to take the final exam.
- Students who have passed the final exam will receive a certificate of attendance reporting the final grade and the linguistic level achieved (according to the CEFR levels).
- 6 CEFR credits will be assigned to Erasmus+ students and other international exchange students by the Università Europea di Roma if they pass the final exam
- Students who have attended at least 80% of the sessions will receive a certificate of attendance regardless of whether they take the final exam or not.

Teaching Methodology:

This module employs a communicative approach where students are engaged in communicating real meaning, thus engaging their natural strategies for language acquisition. The lessons are Interactive and structured in :

- Individual activities
- Pair or small group activities
- Assignments to be completed

Goals:

This course is designed for students who can already navigate communication in familiar contexts. It includes activities focused on listening and reading, conversation, writing, and exercises to enhance grammar application.

The course content provides the student with the necessary Italian language skills to take the **CILS exam at a B1.1** level (Certificazione di Italiano come Lingua Straniera – i.e. Certificate of Italian as a Foreign Language). The CILS certificate can be used for academic or professional purposes and is recognised by the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Further self-study material and direction will be given to those students who are interested in this certification.

The course also aims to assist students in adopting an autonomous and personalized approach to language learning, encouraging research and study in their areas of interest. Topics on Italian culture, in a broad sense, will also be explored.

Specifically, the course aims to:

- facilitate students in their acquisition of the necessary language skills in order to participate in intercultural exchange programmes,
- develop students' intercultural awareness and skills through exposure to texts both video and written
- build up students' confidence in expressing their views in Italian and to improve their fluency by engaging in discussions.
- familiarise students with relevant authentic texts in order to develop their reading skills and acquire essential vocabulary.
- review student knowledge of grammar and students' awareness of the common problem areas at preintermediate level in terms of accuracy and knowledge of key areas of grammar.
- develop students' communication skills in the key areas of daily, social Italian life.
- extend students listening skills by having them respond to videos and audios from the real world, thus, increasing students' knowledge of Italian life and culture.

Grammar

- Review of past tenses: passato prossimo, imperfetto, and trapassato prossimo.
- *Futuro semplice* and *futuro anteriore*.
- Some uses of the subjunctive and conditional.
- Review of pronouns.
- Common impersonal and passive forms.
- Indefinite pronouns and adjectives (qualche, alcuni, etc.).
- Connectives useful for listing, contrasting data, and providing explanations; subordinate conjunctions with indicative and subjunctive moods.

Vocabulary: Strategies for vocabulary acquisition

Assessment Methods

The final class sessions will be dedicated to students presenting an oral project individually or in teams on a topic related to Italian civilization. At the end of the course, a final exam (written and oral) will evaluate the achievement of the required level.

Texts/Bibliography

The course will use both paper-based and multimedia materials (CDs, videos, DVDs, slides, web pages).
